From Our Pastor:

I recently read the trending news story of KFC as it is investigating a report that a family of a 3-year-old girl who said she was asked to leave one of its restaurants because her scars from a vicious pit bull attack were frightening other customers.

The child's grandmother, said she was driving her granddaughter home from the hospital when they stopped at a KFC in Jackson, Mississippi, for a quick bite to eat. The grandmother claims she was asked to leave because her face is disrupting our customers.

National and world media such as CNN, Nancy Grace, Huffington Post and "The Today Show" jumped on the story, lambasting the employees, KFC and KFC's corporate owners.

After it went viral, employees and managers at both Jackson KFC locations have faced death threats, have had drinks thrown at them through the drive-thru window and have faced constant verbal harassment, the source confirmed.

After a little time and further investigation, the story is thought to be a hoax, made up to get sympathy — and donations (\$135,000.00 — even KFC pledged \$30,000 to go to medical expenses).

News reports can push our emotions in rapid fashion.

I have heard so many responses about the decisions made at the PCUSA General Assembly — positive and negative alike. The emotions and feelings about marriage and the Middle East run deep. They can make their way to the surface rather quickly as well (like concerns over a child supposedly being rejected at a restaurant).

Of the numerous overtures dealt with at this year's General Assembly, I agree with some of the decisions made, disagree with others; others still, I just scratch my head and wonder. As my father use to tell me: you win some, you lose some, and some get rained out.

Of all the decisions made, my faith in God still remains as it was.

We at LPC are a very eclectic group. As most downtown mainline churches, we have a host of theological perspectives, shades, views. Our vast number of theological perspectives is what makes us healthy and a challenge as a congregation. I suspect that as a congregation, most of you folks would agree with some of the decisions made, disagree with others; others still, you folks would just scratch your heads and wonder.

As for LPC and decisions of the larger denomination, few of these decisions have an impact on what we do and who we are.

So, before we react to the decisions of General Assembly (positively or negatively), my hope is that we join with Paul who proclaims:

"... but this one thing I do: forgetting what lies behind and straining forward to what lies ahead, I press on towards the goal for the prize of the heavenly call of God in Christ Jesus." [Philippians 3:13-14]

We have a heavenly call of God to be a herald of truth here in Scotland County. We have a number of issues in our community that demand us to remain focused on our call right here — right now.

We can't control all the decisions that are made in the church, or how the media presents them. We can choose to remain focused on our call here. I pray that we do just that.



Heath Rada elected moderator of 221st General Assembly on first ballot

Heath Rada, a retired ruling elder who served the American Red Cross as CEO of the Greater Richmond chapter and president of the Presbyterian School of Christian Education, was elected moderator of the 221st General Assembly (2014) of the Presbyterian Church (U.S.A.) Saturday evening June 14 on the first ballot. Serving with him as vice moderator will be

Larissa Kwong Abazia, Church of Forest Hills, a multicultural, multiethnic congregation in Queens, New York. "I believe the role of the moderator is to listen carefully," Rada said in a news conference following the election. "I will try to do my best to interpret the decisions of the Assembly."

During his speech, Rada displayed a t-shirt that said "Jesus loves you, but I'm his favorite." "That's Original Sin into a sassy sound bite," he said. "How easy it is to wear that t-shirt." But Rada accepted Jesus Christ as his personal savior when he was 12-years-old. Ever since, he said, Jesus has continued to open doors and show new dimensions. Leaders of many faiths have helped me to see that truth can be understood from many different angles. People who were sure they were Jesus's favorites had their minds expanded."

His call as a ruling elder was to develop mediation skills that could be used to make life better. He put these to use in his service with the Red Cross, working to help make peoples lives better in the wake of Hurricane Katrina. "We have to challenge those who want to be favorites. In too many instances we forget the power of the gospel. We need to abound in hope and get rid of this message," he said.

Rada emphasized that "the love of Jesus Christ as Lord and Savior is the foundation that unites us." Heath has a local connection. He studied at St. Andrews, and he preached for us at St. Andrews Sunday four years ago.

Heath is a member of the Grace Covenant Presbyterian Church in Asheville.

Improving Communications

In an effort to be able to communicate with all members of LPC, the session approved the use of a service through "One Call Now." This service allows us to communicate with you through calls to land lines, cell phones, as well as email.

Also for CELL phone users only you can opt to receive text messages. This is helpful for members who do not receive emails to their cell phones. In order to receive text messages from us, because of FCC regulations, you have to text the word "ALERT" to the number "22300" from your cell phone. If you DO NOT wish to receive text messages, simply do nothing.

The One Call Now service also allows us to set up subgroups within the entire church roster. For instance a group has been set up that includes members who primarily use land lines only as their means of communication. If you use email but wish to also receive phone call notifications, please contact me in the church office. I will gladly add you to this call list.

Voice communications through One Call Now can be sent in a variety of ways. Sometimes you will receive a call from me or Neal or another leader in their recorded voice. Another option allow us to use an automated voice. The voice you hear will depend on how we initiate the call, i.e. whether we log on to the One Call Now website or initiate the communication through a telephone call.

Another feature available is the use of mobile apps which staff and leaders can download to their smartphones and use to communicate with the entire church or with a designated subgroup. The use of mobile apps allows us to communicate important information to you wherever we are, even when we are not in the church office.

The use of this service also saves us time. After we initiate calls, One Call Now sends us a report. The one I received last week said, "Since 05/06/2014, you have sent 8 messages to your group, currently with 321 members. We have made 2,388 attempts, re-dialing busy and no-answers, to deliver 1,510 message attempts to your group. At 1 minute per

call, One Call Now Notification Service has saved you 39 hours 48 minutes to date!"

Two important feedbacks that I have received are:
1. If you have a work email or another email address that you want to have added to the notification list, please contact me. I will gladly add it.

2. If you have received calls to your cell or land line that you do not wish to receive because you would prefer to be notified through email only, please contact me. It is very easy for us to remove your name from the call list.

3. As stated earlier, if you get email and want to also get phone calls, please let me know it's very easy to add you to this roster and sub-group.

Thank you for you feedback and assistance. Through the many options that this service provides, we are simply trying to communicate and serve LPC in a more efficient way.

Thanks to José and Mabel’s excellent trip planning, we had a busy and fantastic 4 1/2 days!

Our journeys took us through the mountains, deep into the rainforest, and back in time 500 years to a Spanish colonial fortress. Along the way, we encountered many friendly people, gained new insights into Caribbean history and culture, and relaxed on beautiful beaches. We also sampled new foods, exploring the many culinary uses of the plantain, tasting truly fresh pineapple, and enjoying some really excellent flan.

On Sunday, we participated in the worship service at the Second Union Church in Guaynabo, just outside

San Juan. We sang “Halle, Halle” as an anthem and “May the Road Rise to Meet You” for the benediction. Although the worship service was held in English, we sang some of the hymns in Spanish as well. After the service, we had a lunch provided by some of the members of the church and presented pastor Robert Zoba with a gift from our congregation, a communion chalice and plate made in Seagrove. Their music director, Carlos Rivera, gave each of us a CD featuring Second Union Church’s handbell choir, and also gave José a copy of his curriculum for children’s handbell groups (which Jaime promptly stole). The congregation of Second Union Church has a number of community outreach programs and service projects underway, and we hope to continue our relationship with them in the future.
