Please come support the youth at 6 pm on Sunday, March 29 for a meaningful Easter program and a great fundraiser dinner in the fellowship hall. "A Journey to the Cross" symbolizes Christ's last days on earth. By walking the path that Christ walked, you will be able to focus on the events leading up to Easter. Throughout the church building there will be different "stations" to guide you along the path Jesus walked during his last days on Earth. The reading, prayer and activity will help us remember Jesus' pain and suffering on his journey and his unending love and forgiveness for us all.

Early on in the Christian movement, Jesus' followers remembered Jesus' execution and the places where various parts occurred, recounting the details. By the Middle Ages, pilgrimages to Jerusalem for Holy Week were like the Muslim Haj—a once-in-a-lifetime pilgrimage. When people couldn't go to Jerusalem to walk the via Dolorosa with Christ, the ritual of the stations of the cross was born so that people could journey with Christ spiritually in their own parish devotion. We're going to participate in the ancient tradition of remembering Christ's death. Enter into the experience open to the Lord's presence.

The senior high youth group will guide you through the stations. The middle school youth will provide dinner. Chicken and rice, salad, corn bread and dessert will be \$7.00 and children under 12 will be free. Please join us.

Our Capital Campaign: Building Our Faith

These are exciting times in the life of our church. One of the most energizing things happening is that we have the opportunity to write the next chapter in the journey of Laurinburg Presbyterian Church.

In last month's Messenger, David Harling mentioned a capital campaign in the works for Laurinburg Presbyterian Church. After much hard work from many people, it is finally here!

After turning over every rock, researching every angle, speaking to numerous contractors, engineers, and bus manufactures, the session has compiled the list of needs for ministries of our congregation for a capital campaign.

Building Our Faith (our theme) reflects the long, unbroken line of faithfulness over the 156 years of our shared ministry here at LPC. We can only speculate the extent of the blessings in and through countless lives over those years which have continued to resonate, life to life, generation


to generation as God has worked God's will through this community of faith.

Building Our Faith has three main points: 1) replacing the roof on the fellowship hall with a more durable, longer lasting metal roof (with other much needed roofing repairs), 2) two new premium buses (These buses will be used by the MACS, the youth groups, the Boy Scouts, and other church groups as needed. The two current buses will be employed by the childcare center), 3) needed renovations to the restrooms at the fellowship hall.

We can think of a long line of God's people who have been encouraged, strengthened, healed, and restored by the work of Christ through the ministry of our forebears in faith here at LPC.

This is to encourage us all as we prayerfully consider what role we will each play in this effort as we seek to continue that faithful response to God's blessing of our lives. My hope is that our call to assist is not to respond out of duty, or guilt, or compulsion, but out of a sense of appreciation for all God provides for our lives, and gratitude for all God is in and through our lives. Ultimately it is God who is the source of all that makes life so rich; the air we breathe, the opportunity to work, and the strength, smarts, and skills to avail ourselves of those opportunities, the inspiration to love and friendship, the power which allows us to forgive, the grace to enter into real, authentic life, and the promise of life eternal in Christ. The New Hymnal: Glory to God

Thanks to the gracious gifts of some special folks, the new hymnal, *Glory to God*, will be in the pew racks ready for worship on Easter Sunday!

The 217th General Assembly (2006) authorized the Presbyterian Publishing Corporation (PPC) to create a new hymnal. David Eicher was then called as Hymnal Editor. Presbyterians applied for membership on the Presbyterian Committee on Congregational Song (PCOCS). Fifteen people - pastors, musicians, and members - were called to participate; they began work in 2008. Among these were: Mary Louise "Mel" Bringle, who taught at St. Andrews Presbyterian College from 1983-2000. LPC's former

director of music, William McConnell (PAM, ex-officio) also served on this committee. Early in their process, the PCOCS adopted a language statement and a theological vision statement. Following denominational practice, the committee used "inclusive language with reference to the people of God, and expansive language with reference to God". Some pronouns referring to people were updated from "men" to more common words such as "people" or "folk". Hymns and songs represent the wealth of images for God in Scripture, spanning from the Mother Hen (23:37) to Abba (Mk 14:36) to Creator (Is 40:28) and Lord (Ex 3:15).

The PCOCS consulted various PC(U.S.A.) constituencies through surveys and focused consultations. All submissions were discussed by the committee; author and composer information was hidden to encourage honest dialogue. To move a song forward, a 2/3 majority vote was required for approval. Hymns and songs were examined by task forces before coming to the full committee. The PCOCS's spent their final meeting examining and singing through the complete contents in their proposed order.

Glory of God is the culmination of this multi-year endeavor. The PCOCS presents this collection with a great deal of excitement. They are eager for current and future generations to sing the hymns and songs, get to know the collection, and enjoy the rich diversity of gifts present. Every member of the PCOCS desires that *Glory to God* will serve as an instrument of God's grace.



Happening in the Presbyterian Church USA

The 221st General Assembly (2014) of the PCUSA approved Amendment 14-F last summer, but required a majority of presbyteries to ratify the provision for it to become part of the church's Constitution.

At its meeting on Tuesday, March 17, 2015, Palisades Presbytery became the 86th presbytery to approve an amendment to the PC(USA)'s Book of Order.

Our session will be meeting to discuss what Laurinburg Presbyterian Church will do regarding these changes. Here are some of the common questions and answers that congregations have expressed.

Are congregations and/or pastors required to participate in/host such weddings?

"In no case shall any teaching elder's conscience be bound to conduct any marriage service for any couple except by his or her understanding of the Word and the leading of the Holy Spirit." No pastor is compelled to perform a service of marriage nor a session compelled to use church property for a service of marriage.

Can a pastor in a state where it is not permitted perform a wedding in a state where it is?

The teaching elder has freedom of conscience. Beyond that, it would depend on whether the teaching elder is authorized under civil law to perform a wedding in the state where the wedding is to take place.

Will sessions have the authority to permit (or not) same-gender marriage services in the church?

Yes. Nothing has changed about the authority of sessions in the way church property is used.

If a pastor is willing to preside at the marriage of a same-gender couple, can the session prohibit the pastor from doing so?

No. The session cannot compel the pastor nor can the pastor compel the session. The pastor has the freedom of his or her own conscience and the session has the responsibility for providing for worship and making decisions about the use of church property.

Can the session make a categorical prohibition of same-gender weddings in its building?

Yes. Nothing has changed about the authority of the session with regard to the use of the church building.

Here is the wording of amendment 14-F: The proposed amendment to the Book of Order recommended by the 221st General Assembly (2014)

Marriage is a gift God has given to all humankind for the well-being of the entire human family. Marriage involves a unique commitment between two people, traditionally a man and a woman, to love and support each other for the rest of their lives. The sacrificial love that unites the couple sustains them as faithful and responsible members of the church and the wider community.

In civil law, marriage is a contract that recognizes the rights and obligations of the married couple in society. In the Reformed tradition, marriage is also a covenant in which God has an active part, and which the community of faith publicly witnesses and acknowledges.

If they meet the requirements of the civil jurisdiction in which they intend to marry, a couple may request that a service of Christian marriage be conducted by a teaching elder in the Presbyterian Church (U.S.A.), who is authorized, though not required, to act as an agent of the civil jurisdiction in recording the marriage contract. A couple requesting a service of Christian marriage shall receive instruction from the teaching elder, who may agree to the couple's request only if, in the judgment of the teaching elder, the couple demonstrate sufficient understanding of the nature of the marriage covenant and commitment to living their lives together according to its values. In making this decision, the teaching elder may seek the counsel of the session, which has authority to permit or deny the use of church property for a marriage service.

The marriage service shall be conducted in a manner appropriate to this covenant and to the forms of Reformed worship, under the direction of the teaching elder and the supervision of the session (W-1.4004-.4006). In a service of marriage, the couple marry each other by exchanging mutual promises. The teaching elder witnesses the couple's promises and pronounces God's blessing upon their union. The community of faith pledges to support the couple in upholding their promises; prayers may be offered for the couple, for the communities that support them, and for all who seek to live in faithfulness.

A service of worship recognizing a civil marriage and confirming it in the community of faith may be appropriate when requested by the couple. The service will be similar to the marriage service except that the statements made shall reflect the fact that the couple is already married to one another according to the laws of the civil jurisdiction.

Nothing herein shall compel a teaching elder to perform nor compel a session to authorize the use of church property for a marriage service that the teaching elder or the session believes is contrary to the teaching elder's or the session's discernment of the Holy Spirit and their understanding of the Word of God.
