### What A Great Summer We're Having

Members of our congregation have been traveling a lot this summer. Folks have been going on vacations, going on retreats, doing mission work, camping, and some just enjoying worship and fellowship right here in Laurinburg. The church calendar has been full with the Youth Puerto Rico Mission Trip, Montreat Music and Worship Retreat, Pool Parties, Vacation Bible School, Montreat Youth Conference, and Scout Camp Raven Knob. Finishing out the month of July were 28 Scouts and 5 leaders from our Scout Troop 420 who spent an energy-packed week-long journey camping, working on merit badges, and enjoying nature at Camp Raven Knob near Mt. Airy.

Even with all the coming and going, we've continued to have very good attendance in worship. On July 19th, we finished our week of Vacation Bible School with worship and communion in the Fellowship Hall. Moving worship gave folks who weren't among the large crowd of children, youth and adults with us during the week a chance to experience some of what "VBS: Blast to the Past" was all about.

A great big thank you to everyone who made VBS 2015 a huge success—from our coordinators: Carol Sellers, Carolina Caddell, Sarah Williams, Denise Herr and too many others to mention—along with our teachers, leaders, assistants, decorators, bakers—We had more than 50 adults and youth who helped teach over 110 children during the week that God's love is incredible, faithful, invincible, unconditional, and real!

The week after VBS, many of our youth took off for a week in the mountains to attend Montreat's Youth Conference. This conference is a unique gathering of young people from all over the country for a week of study, worship, and recreation. Activities include morning energizers, music, keynote, small group meetings, afternoon recreation activities, and evening worship.

One of our advisors said she'd go to Montreat every other week because how often can you be in a room filled with 1200 teenagers all excited about Jesus! Our youth will share their experiences and lead us in worship with "This Is Our Story" on **Montreat Sunday August 9**. This is always a great service so come be a part and worship.

On **Tuesday, August 11**, join us for our last Fellowship Pool Party at Scotch Meadows from 7-9 pm. Pizza, drinks and dessert will be served. The rain date is Wednesday, August 12. ### From Our Pastor

*This is an article I did several years ago, that I think it is still pertinent today.*

Corey Widmer is the associate pastor at Third Presbyterian Church and co-pastor of East End Fellowship, a multi-ethnic congregation in an inner city neighborhood

of Richmond, VA. Corey, his wife Sarah and their four daughters live in North Church Hill and have been part of a community development effort there for the last 8 years.

I have heard Corey speak several times about his mission and outreach in the inner city of Richmond. So, when I noticed he penned an article in The Presbyterian Outlook, I was interested immediately. Of course, the title, The 75% Rule, also caught my attention as well.

For Corey, the 75% rule is simply this: When we gather together to worship on Sundays, everyone should be happy with no more than 75% of what is happening during the worship service. That is a rather strange rule. Yet, they hold to this because they recognize that their culturally diverse congregation is so multifaceted, if someone is happy and comfortable with more than 75% of what is going on, it most likely means that the individual's personal cultural preferences are being dominantly expressed. Thus, they decided that no one cultural form will be dominant and everyone will be equally unhappy with the worship!

I must confess, as a minister in a mainline denomination that struggles to retain members and attract new folks, I do not really approach worship with the notion of making everyone equally unhappy with the worship (yes, I am aware that my hymn selections habitually irritate Jim McQueen; yet, I am okay with that).

Corey and his staff firmly believe this rule is true to the pattern of the gospel. Corey holds that one of the most beautiful things about Christianity is that the Holy Spirit is at work in every culture under heaven to create God-pleasing worship that is expressed in all the many particular cultural forms of all the nations of the earth.

I agree with Widmer that worship is not created or acted out in a vacuum. Worship is never culturally neutral. Each element of worship expresses a particular cultural form that will naturally be more welcoming to some and less to others. The hymns and anthems we select, how long our service is, how I preach. All of these aspects communicate certain things about the kind of people that are welcome there and the kind that aren't.

Corey writes: *I am aware that this seriously rubs against the grain of the way people tend to think about worship in the church. Typically we want our "customers" to be as happy with everything in worship as possible so they will keep on coming back, invite their friends, and give us their money! But it may be more faithful to the gospel to call people to sacrifice a degree of personal preference to make space for the other – and that space is often reflected in the way we worship.*

So go on: embrace the uncomfortable. Be willing to endure a song you don't like or a worship form that seems

awkward or out of place. In doing so, you may be opening the door to a person to know Christ and to be welcomed in your community that, were it not for your own worship displeasure, would never have felt at home.

For the sake of the gospel and our faith community, we need to stretch as much as we can to be as welcoming to as many folks as possible.

### How it Works: Hymn Selection

As we are navigating the transition to our new hymnal, *Glory to God*, we thought some of you might enjoy a “behind the scenes” look at how we select the hymns for each week. Neal, José, Sean, and I will meet to pick hymns for the fall (mid-September through the end of the church year) in early August, but the process actually began a few months ago, when we sketched out a calendar for the upcoming academic year. In fact, you should probably take a moment to add the following events to your 2015 calendar: Hymnfest on September 27; Chancel Choir Christmas Cantata on December 6; Christmas Pageant on December 13. Go ahead—I’ll wait. :)

Now that you’ve updated your calendar, let me share some observations on our hymn selection process. First of all, if you’ve spent any time with us as we discuss music, then you know we have a lot of fun. But we also look very seriously at the scripture verses for each day and try to figure out which music works best with each one. There are lots of resources for this: the on line week-by-week lectionary provided by the Presbyterian Mission Association; multiple indexes in each hymnal; and guides and calendars published by the Presbyterian Association of Musicians. We use these last resources particularly heavily as they recommend hymns, anthems, preludes, offertories, etc. for choirs and instruments of all types. Until now, we’ve been using reference books that were nine or even twelve years old, but José picked up some new resources at Montreat this summer so we will be up to date and able to use the new hymnal more effectively. In addition to the lectionary, we also try to match hymns to important days in the life of our church and congregation, including communion, Reformation, Tartan Sunday, and graduation, which is why need to discuss the calendar first.

A few general principles always apply. Opening hymns focus on gathering the congregation and offering praise to God, and they should also be upbeat and encourage active participation. Middle hymns fit with the scripture verses that will be the focus of the sermon—which means Neal and Lyndsey have to make their preaching selections well in advance. The middle hymn is also where we tend to use something slower and more reflective. Closing hymns focus on sending us into the world with God’s message, typically in an uplifting fashion, although sometimes somber reflection is more appropriate at the end of the service. We always try to choose a variety of familiar and unfamiliar music, although one of the challenges José, Sean, and I face is that we’ve all worked with other congregations and other hymnals fairly recently, and tunes get stuck in our heads pretty easily, so things that are familiar to us may not be familiar at LPC.

José usually picks the Chancel Choir anthems prior to hymn selection so that, if the choir is singing a hymn setting as our anthem, we don’t duplicate that with the congregation. Sean usually selects preludes, offertories, and post-ludes after we pick the hymns, and you’ll notice that he often plays variations on the hymn tunes for the week. I try to choose songs for the kids that fit the themes of the scripture readings as well. Our goal is always to have the parts of the service fit together in a coherent fashion, and sometimes (because we pick things so far ahead of time) it doesn’t work out quite as we had anticipated, while other times we are pleasantly surprised by how well a service seems to meld. Hopefully this little peek behind the scenes will help you more fully understand and participate in our collective worship.
