AHH, DECEMBER!

Dear Friends in Christ,

Depending on how prepared you are for the hectic month ahead, you may read the title of this letter quite differently. You may gradually breathe out the words wistfully, quietly anticipating with joy all the wonders of the 12th month. Or you may scream out the words while pulling your hair and grabbing your shopping list, panicked to sense you will never get everything done on time. I hope that the activities here at the church this month prompt the former reaction rather than the latter. But whichever you feel, perhaps it will help to have all the upcoming events at church listed in one place even before the month begins, so here's a start in that direction.

The annual Advent Workshop, 10 am on Saturday, Dec. 3. The CNE committee loves to turn loose the craftier people of the church to work with our children creating decorations and favors for the Christmas season. Come enjoy this event. Parents – kids will practice part of this time for their Dec. 18 performance in worship.

Mission Study Small Group Bible Studies on Dec. 4 or Dec. 7. During the adult Sunday School classes on the 4th or after worship, leaders will guide church members through two passages that help us reflect on a new identity. Lunch is served for the after-worship group, and dinner is offered for the 5:45 Wednesday study as well. Please remember to sign up for the meals and childcare.

Choral Cantata in worship, Dec. 11 – the choir members have begun practicing a Robert Shaw favorite, "Many Moods of Christmas", suites 1 and 3. These songs of the season will accompany the satisfaction of welcoming 6 new members into the congregation. Bonus – no sermon that day!

More Music on the 18th! During worship our children's choirs will lead us in carols of the season as they present the program they have been working on for weeks. In the afternoon, youth groups will head out to Scotia Village to serenade residents there. Then they return to the church for a 5:30 dinner. The whole congregation is invited to join them for the dinner and a time of carol singing. In previous years this was a regular Wednesday night event, but let's do it this year on Sunday evening. (A freewill offering offsets the dinner costs)

Christmas Eve: This wondrous time when cheeks are rosy, children are rambunctious, and the sanctuary is full! Our 5:30 service will be a bit different this year. Children ages 3-10 are invited to come forward for an impromptu

pageant, with grazing sheep and darling angels and as many Marys as we want, all in 15 minutes, as we portray a poetical twist to the Christmas story. Then the mood changes greatly for the quiet 11 pm service of lessons and carols with a Christmas homily by Rev. Hix. At both services we will serve communion and light our candles as testimony to Jesus, the light of the world.

But it's not over yet, because this year Christmas is on a Sunday, and we will worship our Lord on Christmas morning. Once again there will be special music, as a brass quartet wakes us up from a late night and early morning. It really is perfectly OK to be in worship two days in a row!

May these events at your church add to the wonder and delight of the month of December! Let these joyous hours carry you through all the shopping and obligatory parties and help you remember the reason that December really is the "most wonderful time of the year".

Celebrating Advent with Your Family

There are lots of ways to make Advent—the season when we prepare spiritually for the birth of Jesus—a part of your family's holiday traditions. Some involve a daily commitment, while others work on a weekly schedule. Some are easy for young children to participate in, while others may be better for older kids and teenagers. Here are a few suggestions:

A Family Advent Wreath

This is one I remember from my childhood: we had an Advent log, with space for five candles, and we lit them prior to Sunday dinner each week of Advent. It doesn't need to be wreath-shaped. It doesn't need to be complicated—a simple grouping of five candles in the center of your table works well. Kids will enjoy taking turns lighting the candles. Below is a simple litany for lighting the candles, courtesy of the Presbyterian Mission Agency. The opening statement and concluding prayer are always the same; in between, you add a new candle each week:

Opening: We give thanks for the light of Christ, shining in the lives of all people.

Nov. 27: With the prophets Isaiah and Jeremiah, we watch and wait for the coming of Christ, who will bring light and peace to all the world.

(light the first candle)

Dec. 4: With John the Baptist, we cry out in the wilderness, "Prepare the way of the Lord! Repent, for the kingdom of heaven is coming near."

(light the second candle)

Dec. 11 With Mary, the mother of Jesus, we rejoice, for the Mighty One has done great things for us, and Holy is God's name!

(light the third candle)

Dec. 18 With Matthew, Mark, Luke, and John, we tell the story of Jesus, the child of Bethlehem, who came to save us, and is coming again in glory.

(light the fourth candle)

Dec. 24 or 25: With the choirs of angels, we sing, "Glory to God in the highest, and peace to all people on Earth!"

(light the center candle)

Echo Prayer: Light of Jesus,
Show the way.
Shine in us forever;
This we pray. Amen.

An Advent Prayer Chain

This is a simple craft project and daily faith activity for

young kids. Cut strips of construction paper and, working together, write the name of a person or group to pray for on each strip. Then make a chain of interlocking rings using the strips of paper. Each day leading up to Christmas, tear off one ring and pray as a family for whomever is listed on that ring.

The Jesse Tree

Jesse Trees are a bit more complicated, but great if you have older kids or teenagers who are ready to read the Bible on a regular basis. Decorate a small Christmas tree with Chrismons or Jesse Tree symbols (you can find some ideas for these online, but common examples are Apple & Snake, Lamb & Wolf, Rainbow, Fish, Ladder, Ram, Rose, Shell, Crown, and Earth). Try to have one for each day of Advent—or each day you're able to do a little family Bible study—and if you are making them out of paper, you can list the scripture passages on each ornament. In one variation of this, you add a new ornament (or remove one) each day to help count toward Christmas.

The full set of scriptures takes us from November 27 (the first Sunday of Advent) all the way to Christmas, with a reading for each day. But you can adapt this to a weekly plan, or a shorter plan, if that's what works best for your family. You do want to start with Isaiah 11 and end with Luke 2, even if you skip a few in the middle. Read and discuss each scripture selection as a family:

First Week of Advent: Isaiah 11:1-2; Habakkuk 2:1-4; Genesis 1:26-31; Genesis 3:1-19; Genesis 6:11-14; Genesis 12:1-7; Genesis 15:1-6

Second Week of Advent: Genesis 21:1-7; Genesis 22:1-14; Genesis 28:10-22; Genesis 37:1-36; Deuteronomy 5:1-22; Joshua 2:1-21; Ruth 1:15-2:3

Third Week of Advent: 1 Samuel 16:1-13; 2 Samuel 5:1-5; 1 Kings 18:17-39; Esther 4; Isaiah 9:2-7; Isaiah 11:6-9; Jonah 3:1-5

Fourth Week of Advent: Daniel 6; Micah 5:1-5; Luke 1:5-25; Matthew 3:1-6; Luke 1: 26-38; Matthew 1:18-24

Christmas Eve: Luke 2:1-5

Christmas Day: Luke 2:6-21
