GATHERING UP, STEPPING AHEAD A REPORT ON THE CONGREGATION MISSION STUDY EVENT

Dear Friends in Christ,

On Sunday, February 12, over 100 church members remained after worship to receive a report of the Mission Study team and craft responses to 8 key recurring concerns about our future. We enjoyed a delightful meal (special thanks to Sam Fulton, Martha Fulton, and Lillian Boger) and shared table fellowship before launching into our work.

A PowerPoint presentation (copies of the slides are available in the church office) conveyed the results of the Bible studies, community interviews and congregational survey conducted over previous months. Then we broke into 8 table groups to strategize and promote realistic mission plans for each area. Here are the 8 themes and brief summaries of each group's response.

- *How can the church encourage better participation at Sunday school, worship, and youth groups among our current members?*

We need to know why non-participants don't participate. A poll of non-attendees might help us decide what is happening. Some possible solutions include: offering worship at different times to reach those who can't or don't like 11 on Sundays; do better leadership training to expand the pool of capable leaders of all events; enhance the caring ministry through care groups, showing that we really do miss those who are not there.

- *How can the church attract more young families with children?*

Everyone in the church, whether young or old, can reach out to others more, so we need to

educate ourselves on how to be welcoming and how to "market" ourselves in the community. This means expanding our modes, methods, and messages of communication. It may also include other worship times and formats.

- *What strategies would help the church do a better job of "telling our story" through publicity and media?*

For starters, we need a communications/publicity committee of the session. Our website is outdated, the Facebook page is locked out, (just fixed 2/22), and there is no other social media option like Instagram or Twitter. We can continue to use radio and TV but the quality of transmission requires improvement., (also just repaired! 2/22). The Messenger needs a facelift; utilize the newspaper more. Personal outreach by individuals is always important. Obstacles to all these include having technically capable people and money for publicity.

- *What are the best ways to develop even more outreach and mission into the community? What 2 or 3 needs are most pressing?*

Primary need is in the school system. Approach schools to determine best place to help. Secondly, talk to DSS people, on the front line of poverty. Examples of others might include yard cleaning and shopping for elderly, sending cards to prisoners, adopt a highway. In carrying out these missions, include people of all ages, inside and outside the church. Have a combination of long-term and short-term projects. Help fund these through dinners, e.g. Overall: need a mission committee or similar body in church and leaders to take up the cause.

- *Since the future of the church is connected to the future of the community, how can the church be a catalyst for growth and jobs in Scotland County?*

First priority – better jobs require a more educated workforce. Volunteers can support agencies offering tutoring, mentoring and training to

students, to overcome poor home environments. Second possibility – business leaders in our congregation can reach out to industries to offer support and promote a welcoming atmosphere for new business, e.g. church play an active part in Chamber of Commerce and economic development agencies. For everyone – promote a positive attitude about the community; be ambassadors for Laurinburg.

- *What would help LPC become an even more hospitable, welcoming congregation to improve diversity and our public image?*

Two parts to this – a dedicated Mission Committee could develop new projects to meet community needs and support current ones like the North Laurinburg School. Secondly, we have to help people feel welcome at worship – start up the passing of the peace again; do a better job as greeters; reinstitute new member packets; better signage; regular name tags.

- *Families are busy and often miss church for sports, travel, work. How can we help them have a sense of “Sabbath” and community in our very mobile world?*

Sabbath can be at various times. Seek multiple opportunities for people to participate, like a multi-generational Bible-based study, a midweek worship with the Sunday sermon but modern music, expand online resources, e.g. stream sermons, have website based studies, promote via social media. Could we build a labyrinth in the parking lot?

- *What strategies would help us develop and encourage more spiritual growth and spiritual practice, e.g. prayer, in our members?*

Strengthen existing programs and encourage attendance. Explore new ideas to grow conversations about faith. Walk to Emmaus? Chrysalis for youth? Prayer group to pray for the church regularly.

To this long list of suggestions about mission plans, the table groups also added one more task: writing and voting on a new VISION STATEMENT for the church. We reviewed lots of examples from other fields and some from other churches. We suggested many good alternatives: “Rooted in Christ, Growing in Faith, Reaching Out to Serve the World God Loves” and “Growing in Faith, Serving our Neighbor, Moving Closer to God” got a lot of votes, but the winner by a good margin was short and

sweet: “The Word In Action”. This new Vision, if approved by the Session, will start appearing on newsletters and bulletin covers in the future.

So, it was a busy day. The writing team of the Mission Study group will pull together what we did at this event and add it to other parts of the study like a church history and descriptions of the church’s ministry and the Scotland County area. All of this will be finalized in a document for your review and approval later. We trust the work of this day will encourage long-term faithfulness in our church’s mission.

TIMETABLE FOR ELECTION OF PASTOR NOMINATING COMMITTEE

We should soon be able to elect a pastor nominating committee (PNC) to find our next installed pastor. The Committee on Ministry for the presbytery will act on our request to start that process at their March 7 meeting. At the session meeting of Feb 20, the elders decided that as soon as that permission is granted we will follow this guideline in choosing members of the PNC: 2 elders nominated from the current session; 2 deacons nominated from the current diaconate; 1 nominee from the youth group; 1 nominee from the Presbyterian Women, and 3 at-large members selected by the standing Congregational Nominating Committee. It is key that these people be thoroughly representative of the whole congregation. These nominees will be elected at a congregational meeting. Since the Mission Study is nearly completed, the eventual PNC will have less work to do than previous committees and can promptly initiate a search for our future pastor. Your prayers for this important process are valuable and appreciated.

“LORD, TEACH US TO PRAY” A LENTEN STUDY ON PRAYER FUN ADULT SUNDAY SCHOOL CLASS

From March 12 to Palm Sunday, April 9, Dr. Hix will lead a discussion on Spirituality and the Lord’s Prayer. Based on a Kerygma resource by Dr. John Purdy, Duane will help us review the themes of the prayer Jesus taught his disciples. We will look at each phrase in the prayer, from “Our Father” to “Deliver us from Evil”, and let those phrases guide us into a better understanding of what prayer entails. Class members will be able to share their own experiences with the frustrations and insights of a prayer life. Then we will ask questions for discussion like “How close should we come to a holy God?” and “What are we actually asking for when we seek forgiveness of our debts?”

Classes will have time for short teaching segments, personal sharing, writing exercises, and discussion of theological ideas involved in prayer. One of the recurring themes that surfaced in the mission study was how to

encourage growth in spiritual practices like prayer among our members. We hope this short course helps us respond to that question. 9:40 to 10:40 in the Fun Adult room off fellowship hall.

PRESBYTERIAN PRESENCE

In March, the full Presbytery of Coastal Carolina will meet in Morehead City. One large item on the agenda will be to approve or disapprove the amendments which came down from the 2016 General Assembly. In the past several years the term "teaching elder" was used for ministers but returning to the old wording "Minister of Word and Sacrament" is being proposed. This then involves a lot of different items within the Book of Order to be changed.

Another important item is the statement "The Lord's Supper is open to all regardless of age or understanding." Explanations of the reasoning of the change is always available.

But perhaps the most proposed changes are in the replacement of the Directory of Worship. In the opening statement to this part it is said, "The Directory of Worship describes the theology that underlies our worship, outlines appropriate forms of worship and highlights connections between worship and Christian life, witness

and service.”

As such, the chapters are The Theology of Christian Worship, the Ordering of Reformed Worship, The Service for the Lord’s Day, Pastoral & Occasional Services, and Worship and the Christian Life. I found the reading of the Directory to be clear, understandable and perhaps even less formal than previously. It will be interesting to see how our presbytery addresses each amendment and then how the total church votes.

Christian Ed Corner: Lenten Devotions for Families

Sometime in the 300s, Christians began to treat Lent—the 40 days prior to Easter—as a time of fasting, confession, penitence, and reflection. But how can

modern American families incorporate these Lenten attitudes into our busy lives? The most common approach seems to be giving up some sort of beloved food item (chocolate, French fries, pizza, wine, etc.) as a partial fast, but we typically don’t build any real devotional activity into the season.

So why not try something new this year during Lent? The basic form of this devotion is simple: Pray, Read, and Reflect. Use the prayers and scripture passages below.

Ash Wednesday (March 1)

Opening Prayer: Gracious God, out of your love and mercy you breathed into dust the breath of life, creating us to serve you and our neighbors. Call forth our prayers and acts of kindness, and strengthen us to face our mortality with confidence in your mercy.

Scripture Reading: Matthew 6:16-21

First Week of Lent (March 5-11)

Opening Prayer: Lord God, our strength, the struggle between good and evil rages within and around us, and the forces that defy you tempt us with empty promises. Keep us steadfast in your word, and when we fall, raise us again and restore us.

Scripture Reading: Matthew 4:1-11

Second Week of Lent (March 12-18)

Opening Prayer: O God, our teacher and guide, in the waters of baptism you bring us to new birth to live as your children. Strengthen our faith in your promises, that by your Spirit we may lift up your life to all the world.

Scripture Reading: John 3:1-17

Third Week of Lent (March 19-25)

Opening Prayer: Merciful God, the fountain of living water, you quench our thirst and wash away our sin. Give us this water always. Bring us to drink from the well that flows with the beauty of your truth.

Scripture Reading: John 4:5-26

Fourth Week of Lent (March 26-April 1)

Opening Prayer: Bend your ear to your prayers, Lord, and come among us. By your gracious life and death for us, bring light into the darkness of our hearts, and anoint us with your Spirit.

Scripture Reading: John 9:1-41

Fifth Week of Lent (April 2-8)

Opening Prayer: Almighty God, you sent your Son into the world to free us all from sin and death. Breathe upon us the power of your Spirit, that we may be raised to new life in Christ and serve you in righteousness all our days.

Scripture Reading: John 11:17-44

Palm Sunday (April 9)

Opening Prayer: Sovereign God, you have established your rule in the human heart through the servanthood of Jesus Christ. By your Spirit, keep us in the joyful process of those who with their tongues confess Jesus as Lord and with their lives praise him as Savior.

Scripture Reading: Matthew 21:1-11

Maundy Thursday (April 13)

Opening Prayer: Eternal God, in the sharing of a meal your Son established a new covenant for all people, and in the washing of feet he showed us the dignity of service. Grant that by the power of your Holy Spirit these signs of our life in faith may speak again to our hearts, feed our spirits, and refresh our bodies.

Scripture Reading: John 13:1-17 and 31-35

Good Friday (April 14)

Opening Prayer: Almighty God, look with loving mercy on your family, for whom our Lord Jesus Christ was willing to suffer death on the cross.

Scripture Reading: John 19:16-35

Easter Vigil (April 15)

Opening Prayer: O God, you are the creator of the world, the liberator of your people, and the wisdom of the earth. By the resurrection of your Son free us from our fears, restore us in your image, and ignite us with your light.

Scripture Reading: John 20:1-18

Easter Sunday (April 16)

Opening Prayer: God of mercy, we no longer look for Jesus among the dead, for he is alive and has become the Lord of life. Increase in our minds and hearts the rise of life we share with Christ, and help us to grow as your people toward the fullness of eternal life with you.

Scripture Reading: Luke 24:1-12

Reflection can take many forms, which means you can do whatever works best for your household, and can try different formats each week, if you like. Younger children can draw pictures that represent the day's Scripture reading, while older kids and adults create doodles using key words from the text. Then share your images with each other. Or try taking a walk, encouraging all family members to walk in silence and think about the story for a few minutes, followed by discussion. Work together to write a new prayer based on the text. It's up to you—the important thing is to observe the "Pray, Read, and Reflect" form each time.

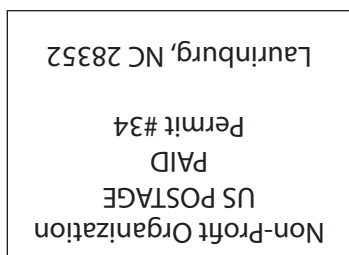
