From Our Pastor

“I Missed It”

The summer of 2010 finds me in Minneapolis as a commissioner to the 219th General Assembly for the Presbytery of Coastal Carolina. We have a more grand and controversial issues before us. So much so, I must confess, The Belhar Confession seems of little consequence to me.

The Belhar Confession (Afrikaans: Belydenis van Belhar), a Christian statement of belief originally written in Afrikaans in 1982, is written as a protest against a heretical theological stance by the white Dutch Reformed Church that used the Bible and the Confessions to justify the harsh and unjust system of Apartheid in South Africa.

According to the Belhar Confession, unity is both a gift and an obligation for the church. This unity originally refers to non-segregation between Christians of different races.

Another key theme of the Belhar Confession is the dichotomy of reconciliation and the justice of God. According to the confession, God is the God of the destitute, the poor, and the wronged, and for this reason the church should stand by people in any form of suffering. It claims that individual, racial and social segregation is sin, and that all forms of segregation always lead to enmity and hatred.

With everything else before us, I confess, while I truly am spiritually in agreement with and deeply moved in a spiritual manner by Belhar, it is not my chief concern. Besides, we have The Confession of 1967 which calls us to racial reconciliation and unity as a people of faith. Furthermore, we are top of this aspect in the church. We are an enlightened folk; we know what we are to do. We are making strides in this area. Right?

The Belhar Confession does not become a part of our Book of Confessions in 2011.

Recently, Deb and I walked across the Duke campus—the place that pushed me to think of theology in such terms of reconciliation on many pragmatic ways, including racial reconciliation. We walked past

a lamppost with the sign that reads: We Believe in Diversity. Deb snaps a picture; I knew that picture is coming. I know her. I know what she's thinking. She's thinking of the recent events on campus and in our society.

Deb is thinking of the yellow-rope noose found hanging from a tree in a commons area of campus (we walked past the tree earlier in our trek across campus). With an alleged event of racial harassment several weeks earlier on Duke's campus and now the noose, the sign about diversity hangs over us in haunting fashion. These events on a very diverse campus, along with numerous other racially-charged events in our nation (Walter Scott in North Charleston, the most recent example), racial nerves continue to be frayed.

Last summer, the 221st General Assembly, votes to amend the Book of Confessions with The Belhar Confession. Approval of Belhar requires 114 affirmative votes (there are 172 presbyteries). As of the last official count (4/7/2015), The Confession of Belhar vote count stands 103 - For and 20 - Against. With 49 presbyteries remaining, 11 presbyteries must vote in the affirmative for Belhar to pass.

I must confess: I missed it in 2010. It did not matter either way to me back then; it matters to me now. I want it to pass in a deep way. I want it to pass because it says that reconciliation of races and care for those in need matter to us as Easter people. I want it to pass to proclaim these issues that matter to us as people of God. They are difficult issues. These are matters of struggle. These are the concerns of God. These are not merely headline news stories for mainstream media; these are the concerns in play in our own community. I want it pass so we as LPC will proclaim and live out our faith putting folks in need in our community at the forefront of our concern.

I missed it in 2010. We need The Belhar Confession because we do not have a handle on these issues. We need it because even the church can lose focus of our mission. As Belhar reminds us--"[I]n following Christ the church must witness against all the powerful and privileged who selfishly seek their own interests and thus control and harm others."

We need The Belhar Confession not only to remind the world what we believe; we need The Belhar Confession to remind us what we believe and how we are to live as Christians.

I find the following excerpt from The Belhar Confession to be at the very heart of who we are as the church:

We believe ... that God, in a world full of injustice and enmity, is in a special way the God of the destitute, the poor and the wronged that God calls the church to follow him in this; for God brings justice to the oppressed and gives bread to the hungry; that God frees the prisoner and restores sight to the blind; that God supports the downtrodden, protects the stranger, helps orphans and widows and blocks the path of the ungodly; that for God pure and undefiled religion is to visit the orphans and the widows in their suffering; that God wishes to teach the church to do what is good and to seek the right; that the church must therefore stand by people in any form of suffering and need, which implies, among other things, that the church must witness against and strive against any form of injustice, so that justice may roll down like waters, and righteousness like an ever-flowing stream; that the church as the possession of God must stand where the Lord stands, namely against injustice and with the wronged; that in following Christ the church must witness against all the powerful and privileged who selfishly seek their own interests and thus control and harm others.

I missed it in 2010. But, now, as we move forward, we must follow Christ and stand by people in any form of suffering and need and witness against all the powerful and privileged who selfishly seek their own interests and thus control and harm others.
