THE MISSION STUDY BEGINS

Dear Friends in Christ,
The rather cryptic title of this month's Messenger letter is my way of saying that the next four months will have a major impact on what the next ten years may look like at Laurinburg Presbyterian Church. The team of church members who agreed to lead the Mission Study process have begun meeting. We expect that, with your participation and support, we will work between now and mid-February to accomplish most of our tasks. Here are some things you may expect from the Mission Study Team over that time.

One part of the "Holy Conversation" we want to have seeks God's guidance through scripture. Please watch for invitations to small group Bible studies, looking at biblical figures seeking new identities and directions for their lives. If you are willing to host a small group in your home or lead one of the studies, contact team members Lynn Massey, Maggie Wells or the church office.


The second part of that "Holy Conversation" requires us to consider our church and its local context. Personal Reflection Guides will go out electronically and in bulletins. Those guides ask your individual responses to the key Five Questions of the study: Who have we been? Who are we now? Who are our neighbors and what do they think of us? What does God want us to do within the congregation? And: What does God want us to do outside the congregation? Think about those questions and use your ideas to respond to later inquiries.

A congregation wide survey will ask a variety of questions about demographics, preferences on pastoral style, worship styles, theological issues, and areas of possible disagreement. These confidential surveys will let you share freely your concerns and hopes for future ministries of the church.

To the above exercises, we will add results of community interviews with business and government leaders, social workers, familiar and unfamiliar neighbors in the city. From these interviews we hope to gain a sense of emerging issues and the "image" our church has among residents around us.

Finally, in early February we will invite you to a "mini-retreat" that presents the results of all these things and asks you to help us develop a systematic plan to address the issues that have arisen. Please mark your calendars for February 12, the date we have tentatively chosen for this key closing event.

I hope you will take an active part in these opportunities and events. Your participation means that congregation members have a significant role in setting the future of

our church. Four months  10 years!

STEWARDSHIP

Dear Friends in Christ,
October 15, 2016

This letter introduces our annual stewardship campaign. At the end of the letter, I will appeal for your generous support of our congregation's ministry and mission. If you want to be done in a hurry, skip now to the last paragraph, fill out the enclosed card and bring it to worship on November 13. 30 seconds max, if you're really rushed.

But please, don't do that. Slow down a minute. Read what I have to say, think about the work God is doing in your church, consider the blessings God has granted you, pray daily about your response, and then fill out the card and take it to worship.

There are two main points I want to make in the letter. First, stewardship is an attitude, an attitude you develop in relationship to God. It isn't primarily a request for money, but an approach to money. Stewardship is everything you do with your life and your possessions after you profess that Jesus Christ is your Lord and Savior. It's a commitment to put God first when you handle your expenses and investments. It's saying: "Here's your full share, Lord. I trust you with it. Now I will arrange things so that my family can live relatively comfortably with the rest." If everyone in our congregation cultivated that approach to money, became a conscientious steward of what God has entrusted to them, and moved toward tithing, we would not need annual "stewardship" campaigns, because we would already have as much money as God intends for us. That's point number one. Try it on for size.

The second point is this: there are many good causes and non-profit agencies through which to honor God with your stewardship. I know that, but I want you to see that the church is the right place to put the majority of your tithe to God. So let me remind you of our great youth group program, the increased attention to pastoral care we have made with a new visitation assistant, the wonderful music that Jose, Sean, Jamie and the choir provide, the response we are just now making to flood victims, the way our church facilities are available to

community organizations, and our attention to the poor of our area through our support of local agencies. All of this, and so much more, we do because the root of our caring is our faith in God. These good programs spring from generosity, and generosity springs from gratitude, and gratitude springs from God's grace to us. Please help us continue this grace-filled work.

Earlier this year when expected income was finally decided, it was necessary to reduce the budget and cut some important items. I hope we don't have to do that again. Look closely at the Financial Stewardship card, evaluate your income, and decide on a percentage you will give to the church. If possible, increase the percentage from last year so you can gradually achieve the Biblical model of tithe. Please accept my thanks for being a faithful disciple of Jesus Christ. 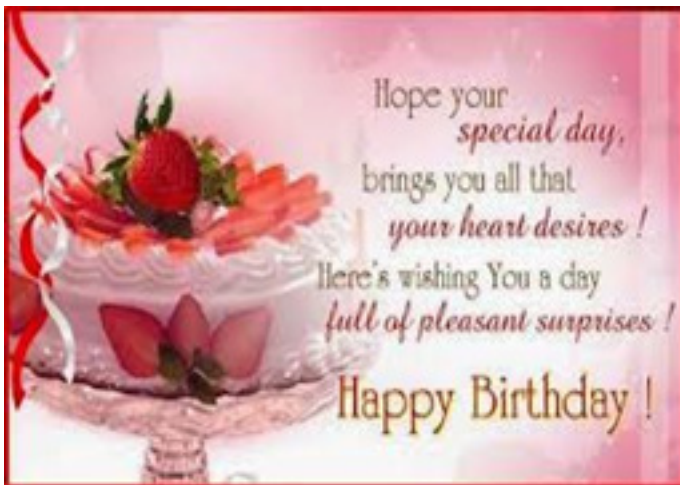
