From Our Pastor:

A friend of mine shared this story. I'd like to pass it along. David Mazel tells the story of Sadie Josephson. When she was seventy-five years old, her husband died, leaving her with little insurance and an old house. Sadie decided to become a laundress, something she knew she could do well. Soon all her neighbors in Brooklyn preferred Sadie to the local Laundromat. She did everything by hand. Sadie would go around the neighborhood and collect their wash in her little red wagon. Then she would pull it home, carry the wash to her basement, fill her tubs with steaming hot water, fetch her bar of yellow soap and washboard, get down on her knees, and scrub away. When she was done washing she would wring each piece under the tap until it was soapless.

Up the stairs Sadie would go and out the back of her house to the greenhouse. There, clotheslines were strung. Sadie would hang the clothes until they were dry and then attack each piece with her iron until they contained no wrinkles. When the laundry was folded and stacked it was time to load her red wagon for the return trip through the neighborhood. One day David decided to save Sadie a trip by picking up his laundry at her home. He was

filled with compassion for the seventy-five year old widow.

"Why do you do such heavy, tedious labor?" David asked the laundress. How could he help her? In reply, Sadie told him her story. "God gives me two candles, the candle of strength and the candle of hope. Some days the candle of strength is blown out and I only have the candle of hope. Other days the candle of hope is blown out and I have the candle of strength. God does not let both candles go out at the same time." And with that she gave him his laundry and shoed him on his way.

Romans 15:13 "May the God of hope fill you with all joy and peace as you trust in him, so that you may overflow with hope by the power of the Holy Spirit."

When I hear this story, I think of many folks in our congregation. Everyone endures difficult situations. Sadie gave herself away, giving of herself to others. She was filled with hope and strength through the power of the Holy Spirit. Hope and strength carried her through when she needed one or the other.

And I say to you, LPC: May the God of hope fill you with all joy and peace as you trust in him, so that you may overflow with hope by the power of the Holy Spirit. May the candles of hope and strength continue to burn in the days ahead.

Anyone interested in working on Chrismon ornaments please meet in the Session Room on Wednesday September 10th at 4:00. Our goal is to have 24 Chrismons completed by November 5th. These beautiful ornaments are made with gold wire, gold beads, and pearls. This year we will be working on some new designs: *Fishes and Loaves, New Celtic Cross, Embellished Latin Cross, Beaded Ribbon Cross, Shield of Phillip, 3D Celtic Cross, Single Pearl Key, and Fisherman of Men.* We are asking for a donation of \$30.00 per kit this year. Checks should be made out to LPC with "Chrismon" written in the memo line.

We will follow the same format as last year; come and work together on the ornaments, or if you prefer you can always take the kits home with you to work on them. Also if you would like to donate a Chrismon kit, but do not wish to put it together yourself, we will be glad to do it for you. Here is a little bit of historical information: The Chrismon tree bears symbols or monograms about Jesus our Savior and every ornament on the tree is a symbol, or a monogram of Jesus, and we place it there in His honor. These symbols were used by early Christians to show their faith to the world. They were always made in gold and white to symbolize majesty and purity.
